To reread these books to build up fluency and confidence in word reading.

To read words accurately and fluently without overt sounding and blending e.g. at over 90 words per minute, in age appropriate tests. At this stage, teaching comprehension skills should be taking precedence over teaching word reading and fluency specifically. Any focus on word reading should support the development of vocabulary.
